Summary of Barbara Kingsolver's Life

- Barbara Kingsolver was born in 1955, and grew up in rural Kentucky. She earned degrees in biology from DePauw University and the University of Arizona, and has worked as a freelance writer and author since 1985.
- At various times in her adult life she has lived in England, France, and the Canary Islands, and has worked in Europe, Africa, Asia, Mexico, and South America. She spent two decades in Tucson, Arizona, before moving to southwestern Virginia where she currently resides.
- Her books, in order of publication, are: The BeanTrees, Homeland (1989), Holding the Line: Women in the Great Arizona Mine Strike (1989), Animal Dreams (1990), Another America (1992), Pigs in Heaven (1993), High Tide in Tucson (1995), The Poisonwood Bible (1998), Prodigal Summer (2000), Small Wonder (2002), Last Stand: America's Virgin Lands, with photographer Annie Griffiths Belt (2002), Animal, Vegetable, Miracle: A Year of Food Life (2007), The Lacuna (2009),

• Flight Behavior (2012), Unsheltered (2018), How To Fly (In 10,000 Easy Lessons) (2020), and Demon Copperhead (2022). She served as editor for Best American Short Stories 2001. Reduce and relieve pain
Can sometimes create a sense of
euphoria
HIGHLY habit-forming and addictive
SIDE EFFECTS:

Drowsiness and sedation

Mental confusion

Nausea and vomiting

Constipation

Pinpoint (constricted) pupils

Slowed or depressed vital signs

Body temperature, blood pressure, pulse and respiration rates

Overdose and Death



Teens and Drugs

9 out of 10 people who meet the clinical criteria for substance use disorders involving nicotine, alcohol or other drugs, began smoking, or drinking or using other drugs, including marijuana, when they turned 18.






- Opioids receptors are nerve cells in the brain, spinal cord, gut, and other organs.
- When these drugs attach to their receptors, they block pain messages sent from the body through the spinal cord to the brain.
- Opioid receptors are also located in the brain's reward center, where they cause a large release of the neurotransmitter dopamine.
- This causes a strong feeling of relaxation and euphoria (extreme good feelings).
- Repeated surges of dopamine in the reward center from drug-taking can lead to addiction.




DRUGS OF ABUSE TARGET THE BRAIN'S PLEASURE CENTER


Brain reward (dopamine) pathways
